

1. **GENERAL.** The Show will be conducted in accordance with the rules and standards contained in the **Royal Horticultural Society's Horticultural Show Handbook** (revised 2016) except where, under this Schedule, they obviously do not apply. This is a useful reference for Exhibitors and can be borrowed in return for a deposit and signature from the Hut, or the Show Secretary, Janet Butler

2. SUGGESTIONS TO EXHIBITORS. Pages 41 to 50 of the Royal Horticultural Society's Handbook (revised 2016) are devoted to offering hints and suggestions to exhibitors. Novices in, particular will find the comprehensive guidance most helpful. Advice covers the selection of material in the garden, the best methods of carrying and packing and the presentation of material on the show bench. Flowers, Fruits & Vegetables are all covered - together with hints of a general nature. For example, it is suggested that particular attention be paid to the number of specimens for which the Schedule asks - an exhibit consisting of either more or less will be liable to disqualification on the ground that it is 'not according to schedule' ('N.A.S.').

3 INDICATOR - PRIZES, POINTS AND ENTRY FEE. The following **indicators** are used alongside each Class throughout the Schedule to identify the Prize Money that will be awarded to the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Prize winners for the Class (Used to compute the winner of the RHS Banksian Medal from Sections 1 to 7); the Points that will be awarded to the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Prize winners for the Class (Used to compute the winner of the RHS Banksian Medal from Sections 1 to 7); the Points that will be awarded to the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Prize winners for the Class (Used to compute the winner of the S.S. 6. STAGING OF EXHIBITS will take place from 17.00 to 19.00 on Sunday 25th August and from 06.45 to 09.00 on Show Day. During staging, exhibitors should address

any queries to one of the Stewards or to any member of the Committee in attendance. All Exhibitors' ENTRY CARDS will be issued from a table by the Main Entrance to the Show Marquee and should be placed <u>face downwards</u> with the exhibits. (RHS Show Handbook (2016) (p21: 6). Would EXHIBITORS who have entered for a Class but decide not to stage an exhibit please return the Card to the desk. Small white ('Variety') cards will also be available. Exhibitors are requested to use these Cards to 'name' their exhibits; this helps visitors to the Show later in the day. Errors in naming will not disqualify the entry but Judges will regard clearness and correctness as telling in favour of an exhibitor in a close competition. If an exhibitor does not know the name of a 'cultivar' the Card should bear the wording 'NAME UNKNOWN'.

7. **REMOVAL OF EXHIBITS WILL NOT BE PERMITTED UNTIL** between 16.45 and 17.00 on Show Day, without the Show Secretary's approval. **Exhibits, which remain at 17.00, will be auctioned with proceeds to the Society.**

8. KINDS AND CULTIVARS. The term KIND is used throughout the Schedule for the classification of flowers as well as fruit and vegetables. Peas, carrots, onions are KINDS of vegetables; roses, dahlias, iris are KINDS (Genus, species or hybrids) of flowers. The term CULTIVAR is used for varieties of kinds of flowers, fruit and vegetables. Peace and Virgo are CULTIVARS of roses, Onward and Alderman are CULTIVARS of peas.

9. VASES. A range will be available from the Society, but we cannot guarantee there will be sufficient for all exhibitors.

10. PLATES AND DISHES. Where indicated these will be supplied by the EHS, in the sizes required. The diameter of a pot or pan is the inside measurement made as close to the top as possible. With square or rectangular pots the area is expressed in square cms calculated by measuring straight across the top at right angles to the rim.

11. DECISIONS AND PROTESTS. On the relative merits of the exhibits, the Judges' decision is final but the Committee reserves to itself the decision on any other dispute. A protest MUST be made in writing and given to the Show Secretary by 14.30 on Show Day with a £2 deposit, refundable if the protest is upheld.

12. ELIGIBILITY OF EXHIBITORS. On all questions regarding the eligibility of an Exhibitor the decision of the Committee shall be final.

13. EXHIBITS MUST BE THE PROPERTY OF THE EXHIBITOR. Unless otherwise stated, all exhibits must be the property of the Exhibitor and must have been in his/her possession for at least 2 months prior to the Show. The Committee reserves the right to visit, before or after the Show, gardens and/or allotments from which exhibits have been entered for competition.

14. NUMBER OF ENTRIES IN A CLASS. An Exhibitor may stage only one entry in any one Class.

15. NUMBER OF ENTRIES PER HOUSEHOLD. Unless otherwise stated in the Schedule, two or more persons may not compete separately in the same Class with produce from the same garden and/or allotment. This ruling does not apply to Classes such as floral arrangement where Exhibitors are allowed to use plant material, which has not been grown by themselves. If members of a family wish to share the credit and prizes then the exhibit should be entered in joint names.

16. CONSTITUTION OF AN EXHIBIT. Where a number or quantity of plants, flowers, fruit or vegetables is specified in the Schedule for a Class, vase, dish or collection neither more nor less than the number or quantity may be shown and an exhibit will be disqualified

for any excess or deficiency. If, before an exhibit is judged, any excess or deficiency is noticed and considered to be the result of an accident and not an attempt to deceive, the referee, steward or secretary may give the Exhibitor (if at hand) an opportunity to correct the mistake but the officials shall not be under any obligation to do so and any disqualification resulting from an excess or deficiency shall be the Exhibitor's responsibility. The Judges may not correct any error but they may direct the attention of the referee, secretary or steward to it.

17. CONSTITUTION OF DISHES. Every dish must consist of one cultivar (variety) only, unless mixed dishes are permitted by the Schedule.

18. THE RIPENESS OF FRUIT. Apples, pears and gooseberries may be shown either ripe or unripe and all other fruit must be ripe unless otherwise specified in the Schedule. Over ripeness will be regarded as a defect in any fruit.

19. THE CLASSIFICATION OF DESSERT & COOKING CULTIVARS (VARIETIES) OF FRUIT. Apples, pears and plums must be shown as dessert or cooking cultivars in accordance with the classified lists in the RHS Show Handbook (revised 2016) – (see p 81 - 85 for classification of dual purpose apples).

20. FRUITS CLASSIFIED AS VEGETABLES. The following though botanically classified as fruits, are for the purposes of Horticultural Shows, classified as vegetables:

21. EXHIBITS NOT ACCORDING TO SCHEDULE. Any exhibit which does not conform to the wording of the Schedule (unless corrected in accordance with Rule 16) shall be disqualified and a Steward or Judge should write on the Entry Card 'Not according to Schedule' (NAS) and add a factual note as to why it is marked 'NAS'.

22. PRIZES MAY BE WITHHELD. Any prize may be withheld or modified if the exhibits are considered unworthy of the prizes offered.

23. ALTERATION OF EXHIBITS. After judging has taken place no exhibit or part of an exhibit may be altered or removed until the end of the Show, except by special permission of the Secretary.

24. LIABILITY FOR LOSS. All exhibits, personal property etc. shall be at the risk of the Exhibitors and the Society shall not be liable for compensation for loss or damage from any cause whatsoever. Should a Show for any cause not be held, no Exhibitor shall have any claim on the Society. Exhibitors will be wholly responsible for all claims made by their own employees under the Common Law or under any statute for compensation arising out of or in the course of such employment for injury or otherwise. The Society has no responsibility to any but its own employees.

25. THE RHS POINTS SYSTEM FOR JUDGING VEGETABLE AND FRUIT COLLECTIONS. The exhibition value of any kind of vegetable or fruit is governed by the difficulty of producing a perfect dish. The following RHS Show Handbook (revised 2016) maximum points will be used for assessing the points value of dishes in Vegetable and Fruit Collections in this Schedule. See the Handbook for all other vegetables and fruit. The numbers (nos.) column should not be used for the novice classes (page 19)

SOLES TOP TRAY - COMPETITION RULES

1. The Soles Top Tray class is for a collection of three types of vegetables from the following list of fifteen. The quantity of each vegetable required for the collection is given in brackets each type must consist the same variety.

Carrots (3) Cauliflowers (2) Onions (3) Parsnips (3) Peas (6 Pods) Potatoes (3) Runner Beans (6 Pods) Tomatoes (6) French Beans (6 Pods) Sweetcorn (2) Pepper (3) Cucumber (2) Courgettes (3) Red Beet (3) Aubergines (2) Leeks (3)

- 2. Each type of vegetable will be judged out of a total of 20 points. This is split into three sections as follows: seven points for size, shape and colour; seven points for condition: six points for uniformity. The overall mark will therefore be out of a total of 60.
- 3. All vegetables are to be displayed for effect. The vegetables must be displayed within an area measuring 45cm x 60cm, without bending any part of them. No part of any exhibit may exceed the size of the tray.
- 4. A tray or board measuring 45cm x 60cm can be used to display the vegetables, or the area can simply be marked on the staging. Where a tray has a lip or edge, it is the internal measurements that must not exceed 45cm x 60cm.
- 5. A black cloth is permitted, and the tray may be painted. Parsley is allowed for garnishing but no other foliage or accessories, such as plates, sand, rings and so on, will be allowed. Onion tops may be tied or whipped using raffia or string.
- 6. The winner of the Soles Top Tray class will receive a prize card, a special certificate and a £15 National Garden Gift Voucher. The runner-up will receive a prize card, plus a £10 National Garden Gift Voucher.Third place will receive a prize card, plus a £5 National Garden Gift Voucher

NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES

Carrots and parsnips must have foliage trimmed back to 7.5cm. Peas and beans must be displayed with some stalk attached. Tomatoes must be displayed with calyces (the green flower bud case).Judges may handle exhibits, open pods and so on to check for quality. The tray, board or staging must not be cut or mutilated in any way – such as cutting holes for standing onions in. Judges should use their discretion when judging the Soles Top Tray class, remembering that the entries may come from inexperienced exhibitors. The points awarded should be clearly marked by the judges on the exhibitors' cards. Any queries that may arise, regarding anything other than the above rules, should be referred to, and decided by, the show officials.

SOLES TOP VASE COMPETITION RULES

1. The Soles Top Vase class is for a vase of mixed flowering stems containing a total of between 5 and 10 stems, taken from a minimum of two different kinds of plants. Please note that it is two different **KINDS** of plants; two varieties of the same plant are **NOT** two kinds.

- 2. The display will be judged out of a total of 35 points: split into 25 points for the colour, form, condition, quality and freshness of the flowers on display, and 10 marks for the overall presentation and effect of the flowers in the vase. The vase will be viewed from all directions. Judging of the flowers should be to the normal rules used for other classes.
- 3 Stems used in the display must be showing flowers only; no seed heads or berries will be allowed.
- 4 The vase can be any shape and size and made from any material, but must be in proportion to the display. No marks are awarded for the vase itself.
- 5 No accessories whatsoever such as bows and additional foliage will be allowed. Foliage which is growing naturally from the flowering stem, and still attached to that stem, will be allowed. Packing material – including floral foam – to keep the stems in place is allowed.
- 6 The winner of the Soles Top Vase class will receive a prize card, a special certificate and £15 National Garden Gift Voucher. The runner-up will receive a prize card, plus a £10 National Garden Gift Voucher. Third place will receive a prize card, plus a £5 National Garden Gift Voucher.

NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES

Flowering stems can be taken from **ANY** flowering plant. The different kinds of plants need to be taken from different genera. For instance, pinks, carnations and sweet william - which are all dianthus - would <u>not</u> be classed as different kinds. Only fresh, home-grown flowers can be used in the vase. No dried or silk flowers are allowed. A vase, by definition, is any vessel that can be used to hold cut flowers and which is taller than it is wide at its widest point. Soles Top Vase class is open for anyone to enter and is not purely for growers who regularly display single species classes at shows Judges should use their discretion when judging the top Vase class, bearing in mind that the entries may come from inexperienced exhibitors. Judges should note that the display has to be viewed all round. The points awarded should be clearly marked by judges on the exhibitors' cards. Any queries that may arise, regarding anything other than the above rules, should be referred to, and decided by, the show officials.



RECIPES for SECTIONS 11A and 11B

Lemon Drizzle Cake

CLASS

170g (6oz) soft margarine	170g (6oz)self raising flour
170g (6oz)caster sugar	Grated zest of one lemon
4 tablespoons milk	Juice of 1 lemon
2 medium eggs	One tablespoon icing sugar

Cream margarine and sugar together until light and fluffy, gradually beat in eggs and milk. Add flour and fold into mixture with the grated lemon zest.

Place mixture into a greased and base lined 900g (2lb) loaf tin.

Bake 180C/gas4/fan160C for 50-60 minutes until cake is golden brown and springs back to touch or a skewer comes out clean.

Mix the lemon juice and one tablespoon icing sugar together and pour over the cake as soon as it is removed from oven.

Allow glaze to set before removing the cake from the tin.

Victoria Sandwich Cake (guidelines)

This recipe requires equal weights of butter, sugar, flour **and 3 eggs**. Use the creaming method. Divide the mixture between two sandwich tins, bake then cool on a tray. Fill with raspberry jam and dust the top with caster sugar.

Yorkshire Tea Loaf

Makes: 10 slices Preparation time: 10 minutes + soaking. 1¹/₄ - 1¹/₂ hours baking Freezing: not recommended

Each region has its speciality; the fruit is soaked in tea to plump it up. In Ireland it is called Barm Brack. Traditionally it is served buttered.

100g (4oz) sultanas	300ml (½ pint) cold tea
100g (4oz) raisins	1 egg, beaten
100g (4oz) currants	200g (7oz) soft dark brown sugar
50g (2oz) glace cherries, halved	225g (8oz) Self raising flour
50g (2oz) candied peel	1 level teaspoon mixed spice

TIP: mixed dried fruits can be used instead of individual dried fruits.

Grease & base line a 900g (2 lb) loaf tin. Preheat oven to Gas mark 4/ 180C/ Fan 160C. In a large mixing bowl soak all fruit in cold tea overnight. Add beaten egg, sugar, flour & spice to fruit & tea mixture & then stir well. Spoon mixture into tin & cook until a skewer comes out of the centre of cake clean. Turn out onto a wire rack & leave to cool. Store in an air tight tin for a week.
